

Japan. Endless Discovery.

A town with a long and rich history, years and years that have passed with the land, the sea, and a river creating a calm and laid-back background, slowly fostering the culture of the area.

Ota City is the largest city among the 23 cities of Tokyo, and is located in the southwestern part of Tokyo enclosed with Tama River and Tokyo Bay. During the Edo period, Ota City was famous for the Omori dried seaweed, the specialty product of the town, and as the town used to be located on the Tokaido, the main road connecting Edo and Kyoto, the town developed its unique culture through a constant flow of people passing through it. Visitors will find here many old temples and shrines and other sites of historical heritages. No matter where you go - north, south, east or west - in Ota City you will never fail to find all kinds of delights.



Quiet and tranquil atmosphere of an upper-class residential area

Denen-chofu known as an upper-class residential area is the first town in Japan to be developed systematically. The development started in 1918 (7th year of the Taisho Era) based on the "Rural city" idea - a concept by Eichi Shibusawa which meant combining natural environment of pastoral land with convenience of a city. The roads with ginkgo trees on the roadside spreading from the Denen-chofu Station to all directions just like the spokes of a wheel are the symbol of Denen-chofu.



A town giving tourists plenty of opportunities to enjoy their visits at leisure - both for lovers of historical heritage and shopping.

Shimo-Maruko, a town of commoners. Many shops stand side by side in the shopping center in front of the station, welcoming travelers with a large selection of all kinds of products. Cherry trees bordering the road on the banks of Tama River are well known as the landmarks of this area. The trees growing here are called "21st Century Cherry" as the trees' planting here started in 2004. Everyone is looking forward to seeing the grown-up trees in a few years or decades to come. A large number of temples and shrines, such as the Nitta-jinja Shrine and the Resinkoin Temple are located in the area, and it is a real pleasure to visit them and think of the lives of people who lived around here long time ago.



A river flowing right through the megalopolis with banks still retaining the blessings of the nature

Tama River with its headwaters in Mt. Kasatori located in Yamanashi Prefecture is 138km long. The lowest stream of the river is in Ota City, and from here it flows into Tokyo Bay. Tama river is quiet and peaceful near the mouth of the river, and the parks and wooded areas on the riverside are places for relaxation frequented by inhabitants of the city. The various small animals living near the river are truly a treasure given to us by nature. The quiet water and the rich natural heritage spreading gracefully around the river never fail to bring peace to the ailing mind of modern visitors.



A town that really has all the pleasures from shopping to all kinds of foods

Kamata is the town closest to Haneda Airport. Kamata is conveniently located near the Airport, so you can easily come here to enjoy shopping using several hours of transit time of your flight. Right near the station there are all kinds of shop from very folksy ones to large mega stores. Being able to enjoy good food and drink without needing to go far adds to the charm of this town.


Make sure you don't miss the "feathered" Chinae meat dumpling, the specialty of Kamata.

A sightseeing spot noted for cherry trees blossoming in spring and beautiful autumnal leaves in autumn, dotted with places of historical heritage.


Senzoku-ike, a pond with a 1.2km long walking path around it. The name of the pond literally means "Feet-washing pond", and it is said that the name originates from the fact that Saint Nichiren, who took a rest here on his way, washed his foot here. The pond is also a famous site of scenic beauty. "One Hundred Famous Views of Edo", famous Ukiyo-e printings by Hiroshige Ando includes Myōfukuji Temple, in which visitors can still see the pine, on which Saint Nichiren hung his shoulder-worn robe, the grave of Katsu Katsu, and a water garden - there are many places of interest for visitors wishing to take a leisurely stroll.



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Visitors are recommended to take a walk here - the road leads to the shopping street in front of the Ootakayama Station.




The town, which used to provide Edo with fish


Today Haneda is a town that is closely connected in everyone's mind to the airport as the town is close to Haneda, but in the old times it used to prosper as a fishing town, where fishers came back from the sea bringing fish to be sold to the Edo folks. Various sites of historic heritages, such as the embankment made of red bricks and the remains of the Haneda ferry, Goyukkenbana-muenbotokeodou, Anamori-inari-jinja Shrine, and the Haneda Shichifukujin Shrines still remain in the town, reminding us of its long history.



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A monument that stands at the point, where there used to be Haneda no Washi, where a ferry boat used to connect Haneda to Kawasaki.








Tranquility remaining right in the center of a megalopolis

Ikegami Honmonji Temple is the head temple of the Nichiren sect. It was built during the period from the end of the 17th century to the beginning of the 18th century. It is well known because the grave of Saint Nichiren is located here. Many sites of precious historical heritages, such as the five-storyed pagoda designated as an important cultural property of the country, still remain here, and the Shotoen inner garden that was designed by Enshu Kobori has a quiet atmosphere that one can only savor in a Japanese style garden.





Omori - a perfect place to see the various aspects of Japanese life.

A town of common folks,
a town one can feel at ease in.
Visit Omori to truly rediscover Japanese culture.

In the old days, people of Omori, which is located near Tokyo Bay, used to be engaged in agriculture and fishing, but as the infrastructure of Tokyo became more and more developed, Omori became a hotel town located in between Shinagawa and Kawasaki. Dried seaweed and handicrafts made of straws became the specialties of the area. The culture developed through constant flow of people passing through the town has been passed from generation to generation for a long time now. How about visiting Omori and getting a feel of its unique culture?



Dried seaweed of Omori A specialty famous from the Edo Era

In the Edo Era, the dried seaweed of Omori has been a specialty of the area for many years. The quality was so good it used to be even given as presents to the shoguns and sold all over the country. The stretch of the sea from Haneda and Koujiya to Omori with shallow sea and many rivers flowing into it was an ideal environment for growth of seaweed. It is said that the culture of seaweed cultivation and the technology of dried seaweed production have originated in here in Omori and spread out all over the country. And although today dried seaweed is no longer produced in Omori, many wholesale merchants dealing with dried seaweed are located in Omori, and visitors can learn the history and the culture of dried seaweed at the Omori Hall of Seaweed History.



Tori no Ichi fair of Otori Jinja Shrine A place of many luck bringers

"Tori no ichi" is an event celebrated in Otori jinja Shrines all over the country but mainly in Tokyo in November of the lunar calendar on the day of the eagle ('otori' in Japanese means a big bird, that is, an eagle). It is a tradition that started in the Edo Era in the suburbs of the city. Many people gather at the fair to purchase rakes - a talisman which is said to bring the owner good luck. The busiest time of the year for Otori jinja Shrine in Omori is the time of the Tori no Ichi fair.



Mihara-dori Street (Old Tokaido)

A place filled with memories of Tokaido

A street now called Mihara-dori was in the old days a part of the Tokaido, an old primary route connecting Edo to Kyoto, with the main road always bustling with people. The width of the road stayed the same as it was then. The primary route in the old days has now become a shopping street with many signs of the old Tokaido still remaining, and it is a place bustling with many shoppers today. Another important attraction of the area is the temples and shrines that stood here since a long time ago, such as the Gonsho-ji Temple and the Iwai Jinja Shrine.

Gonsho-ji Temple Mizudome-no-mai (Water Stopping Dance)

An event with no less than 600 years of history, water stopping dance of the Gonsho-ji Temple is held to stop the catastrophic floods that used to plague the area. It is a peculiar festivity centered on two men blowing conch shells who are rolled into straws to make them look like Ryuu, a dragon deity. The two men are rolled on the ground and poured with water on them as the procession goes to Gonsho-ji Temple. The ceremony until the "dragons" dance on the stage on the precincts of the temple is called Mizudome-no-mai. The festival is designated as an important intangible cultural property of Tokyo.



Iwai Jinja Shrine Well

A well that is said to have a peculiar quality: if one with pure heart drinks from it, the water tastes pure and clear, but if one has evil intentions, the water tastes salty. The well used to be located in the precincts of Iwai Jinja Shrine, but when Tokaido was widened during the construction of the Daishi Keihin National Highway and the well was moved to the sidewalk in front of the shrine. The well was designated as a Tokyo's cultural asset.



Ryushi Kawabata Memorial Hall

Exhibiting work of Ryushi Kawabata, the great master in the painting circles of the Showa and Taisho eras. Ryushi Kawabata (1885-1966) is one of the eminent men who used to live in the Magome Writers' Village. The hall was established by an initiative and design of the painter himself in commemoration of his 77th birthday in 1963. The building has a shape of a sea horse.

Magome Writers' Village

A piece of history of Tokyo's men of letters

In the period from the late Taisho to the early Showa eras, many eminent writers and artists, such as Yasunari Kawabata came to live in the area currently called Magome or Sanno, wanting to spend time with creative people with a kindred spirit. This is why this area came to be called "Magome Writers' Village". Using explanation boards erected on the street corners as guides, you can take a stroll and learn of places related to various writers. Also, many materials are available at the Folk Museum.*

Omori Shell Mound

The cradle of Japanese archaeology

In 1877, an American zoologist Morse spotted a shell mound when he was on a train bound for Tokyo. This excavation has become the wake-up call to archaeological research in Japan. Therefore, the Omori shell mound is called "the cradle of Japanese archaeology." The monument of the Omori shell mound is located 3 minutes from Omori Station on foot. If you walk further, you'll get to the Omori Shell Mound Ruins Garden Park.

There are kuroyu onsen public baths as well.

Let's Try Public Bathing

Public bathing is enjoyed with many people. For this reason, the public baths are always kept clean. The cleanliness of Japanese people is famous. Do not worry about sanitation as you venture into public baths.

01



Take your shoes off and put them in a shoe box and pay your entrance fee. Men go to the men's bath and women to the women's. If you haven't brought soap, shampoo, or towels, they can be purchased at the front.

02



Undress in the dressing room. You cannot get in the bath with your clothes on. Put your belongings in a basket or locker. Lockers come with keys. If you have valuables, you can have them safely kept at the front.

03



Open the door and go into the bathing room. The floor is wet so be careful not to slip. Before getting in the bathtub, first wash your body. After washing away the soap you get in the bathtub. Be sure to not put your towel in the bathtub.

04



The bath water is about 104-113 degrees Fahrenheit, which is fairly hot. Slowly submerge your body. Please do not swim in the bathtub.

05



If you stay in the hot water too long, it may make you sick. When you start to feel not so well, get out of the bathtub and rest. It is a good idea to do this a number of times and spread out your submersions. Don't do anything that is too hard on your body.

06



Wipe your body well with a towel before leaving the bathing room. After wringing out your towel, go to the dressing room. Put your clothes on and go outside. You cannot leave the dressing room without your clothes on.

07



Be sure to consume liquids after getting out. Coffee with milk after getting out of the bath is great. Beer at a bar in Kamata would also be good. And then, you may want to go to a Japanese style pub nearby.





Temples and shrines



Haneda Jinja Shrine

Haneda Jinja Shrine was originally established 800 years ago, when the feudal lord Yojiro Namekata created it to enshrine Gozutennō. It is said that the shrine helps people to find their perfect match, and Fuji mound located on the right to the oratory is designated as a cultural asset of the city. The summer gold spring festival held in July every year is famous for its soul-stirring atmosphere.



Anamori Inari Shrine

The shrine is said to have been built in 1804. It used to be located on the present location of Haneda Airport and was frequented by people who visited there to gather shellfish. But soon after the war at the time when the airport was expanded, the shrine was relocated to its present site. It is said that the shrine helps to achieve prosperity in business and general luck with money.



Nitta Jinja Shrine

The shrine is believed to have been established in 1358 to enshrine Nitta Yoshiaki, the second son of Nitta Yoshisada. In the Edo Era, Genmai Hiraga, student of Rangaku (Dutch Studies), made the first Yamoni talisman, out of bamboo growing on the premises. This is why the shrine is said to be the birthplace of the "evil-destroying arrows", good luck charms.



Tamagawa Sengen Jinja Shrine

This shrine is said to have been built by Yonitomo Minamoto's wife Masako Hojo in the Kamakura period. The present shrine pavilions were rebuilt in 1973. The elegant structure built in the Sengen-zukuri style is truly unique among shrines of the metropolitan area. The shrine is built on a hill and is also known as a famous place to enjoy the night view.



Rokugo Jinja Shrine

The shrine was built in 1057 by two military commanders Minamoto no Yoriyoshi and Minamoto no Yoshie - father and son. A pair of stone guardian dogs standing in the garden in front of the kapura hall has been designated as a cultural asset of the city. On the 7th of January of each year, the shrine holds children horseback archery festival with a hope of healthy future for our children.



Manpukuji Temple

A historic old temple that is said to have been built by a general of the Kamakura Era named Kagetoki Kajiwara in the Kenkyu Era (1190 - 1199). On the grounds of the temple there is a five-ring lower that is believed to be the grave of Kagetoki, and a statue of Sunsunji, the favorite horse of samurai Kajiwara Kagekusa. Amida triad, harness, and a wooden sedimentary statue of Kagetoki Kajiwara have been designated as cultural assets of the city.

Museum of Life in the Showa Era

This museum was created in a most ordinary house built in 1951, preserving all the furniture and utensils used at the time just as they were. The museum is managed by a private person, Ms. Kazuko Koizumi. She is a researcher of life history and actually used to live in this house.



Glass Forest

A gallery managed by Forest, a company manufacturing a Japanese traditional Edo kiriko glass. The gallery has an exhibition of glasses and other glassware, and also offers visitors an opportunity to use the machines of the workshop to try and work with glass themselves, but these hands-on experience workshops are offered irregularly.
