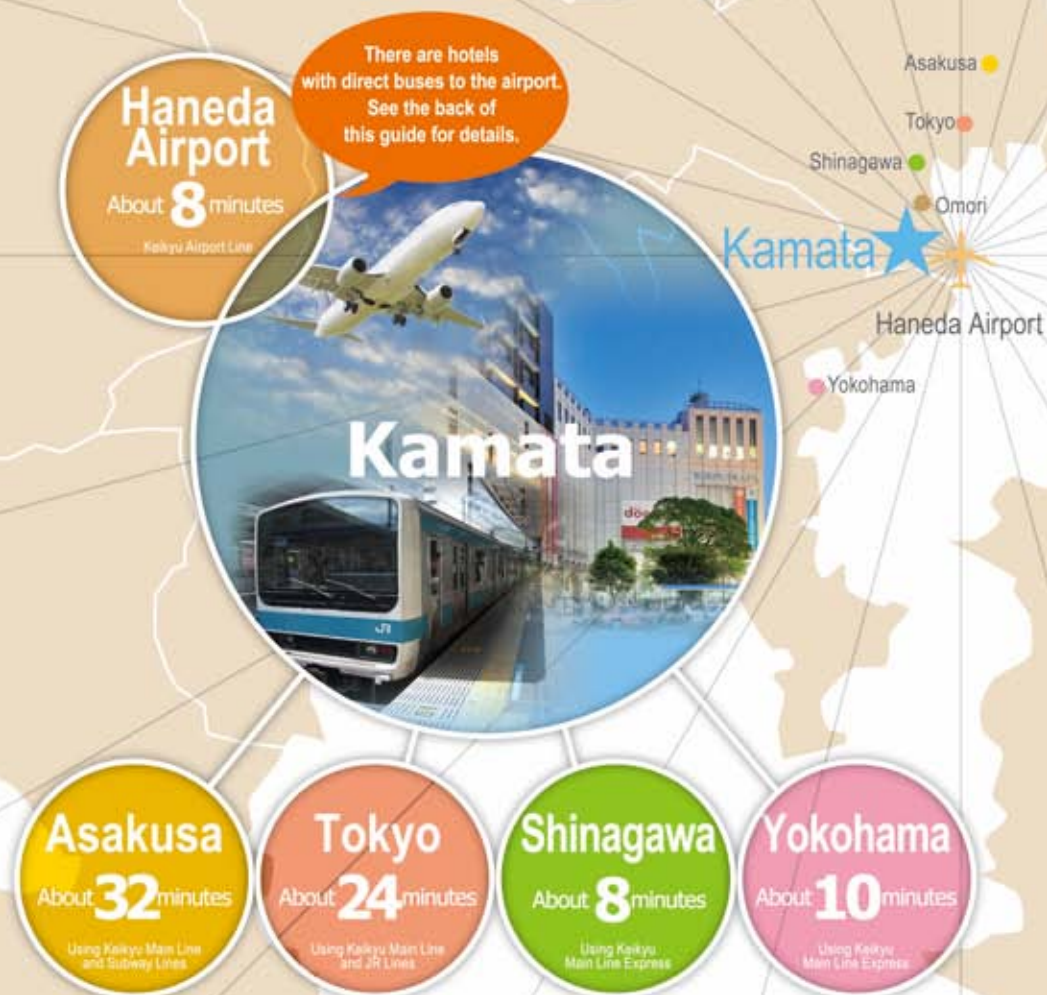

Public bathing is a culture uniquely born out of Japan. Its beginning is old and is said to go all the way back to the Middle Ages. The current style of having wide and large bathtubs was realized in the Edo Period. Since then, public baths have become a place of social fellowship. Not only is it a place to wash your body, but your body and heart are refreshed by stretching out in the large bathtubs. Enjoying conversation with the people you meet there is the Japanese way of enjoying your bath time. How would you like to use a public bath to get to know the Japanese culture? There are kuroyu public baths as well.

Let's Try Public Bathing

Public bathing is enjoyed with many people. For this reason, the public baths are always kept clean. The cleanliness of Japanese people is famous. Do not worry about sanitation as you venture into public baths.

01



Take your shoes off and put them in a shoe box and pay your entrance fee. Men go to the men's bath and women to the women's. If you haven't brought soap, shampoo, or towels, they can be purchased at the front.

02



Undress in the dressing room. You cannot get in the bath with your clothes on. Put your belongings in a basket or locker. Lockers come with keys. If you have valuables, you can have them safely kept at the front.

03



Open the door and go into the bathing room. The floor is wet so be careful not to slip. Before getting in the bathtub, first wash your body. After washing away the soap you get in the bathtub. Be sure to not put your towel in the bathtub.

04



The bath water is about 104~113 degrees Fahrenheit, which is fairly hot. Slowly submerge your body. Do not swim or play around in the bathtub.

05



If you stay in the hot water too long, it may make you sick. When you start to feel not so well, get out of the bathtub and rest. It is a good idea to do this a number of times and spread out your submersions. Don't do anything that is too hard on your body.

06



Wipe your body well with a towel before leaving the bathing room. After wringing out your towel, go to the dressing room. Put your clothes on and go outside. You cannot leave the dressing room without your clothes on.

07



Be sure to consume liquids after getting out. Coffee with milk after getting out of the bath is great. Beer at a bar in Kamata would also be good.

Supporting Public Baths Behind the Scene with the Work of Public Bath Art

Most public baths have the landscape of Mt. Fuji pictured. Landscape painting is difficult work that takes years of training even to be able to beautifully draw the sky.

I have drawn more than 10,000 landscapes over the past 50 years, but successors are few, and I hear that there are only two in all of Tokyo. I try to draw painting that will brighten up hearts. Thus, I creatively bring out a sense of the season from Spring to the beginning of Summer. All work is done by hand, so no two paintings are the same. I hope you get to see as many paintings as possible in public baths in Japan.

Has a long history having opened in 1937. It boasts water so black that your hand cannot be seen after submerging it only a few centimeters. Dining and karaoke can be enjoyed in the large space on the second floor.

Kamata has many public baths with bathtubs containing hot black water. It is called "kuroyu" and is black because of fossils of plants contained in the water. It is not dirty. Black water makes it difficult to see the bottom so please be careful.

The place you should visit at least once if you visit Japan is their Japanese style bars. Alcohol such as beer, sake, and whisky, and food such as meat, fish, and vegetables are offered at reasonable prices. Depending on the place there are famous dishes and chef's recommend dishes. The greatest attraction of Japanese style bars is the relaxing and friendly atmosphere. Fully enjoy "igokochi" (the comfort from which "izakaya" Japanese style bars is derived).

Everyone can easily enjoy Japanese style bars! Formality is not required. Delicious sake, dishes and smiles. Universal joy waits for you.



The appeal of the menu of Japanese style bars are their abundant variety of sake and dishes at reasonable prices. That is why everyone loves them so much. Of course, soft drinks are served as well. Each dish is placed on a plate and is not great in quantity. Enjoy many different types of dishes.



Many give a light appetizer called "otoshi" at the beginning. It is what you enjoy with your drinks while you wait for your food to be made. You pay for it at the end with everything else, but its price is cheap so there is no need to worry. There are ones that do not serve otoshi, and some ask whether you would like it or not, so let them know what you desire at those times.



The style of Japanese style bars is to order whatever you want after looking at the menu. Recently there are many shops that allow you to order with touch screen panels. If a shop does not have a touch screen panel, just look at the pictures, point to what you want and tell them how many you want.



Japanese style bars are restaurants and pubs where you can be at ease. Don't feel like you have to adhere to strict manners. But there is a minimum level of protocol that you should keep. That is simply to not be an annoyance to those around you. Do not shout or make a ruckus. You also cannot bring in food and drink from other stores.



At Japanese style bars you pay when you leave. Most places take credit cards, but at some smaller shops you cannot use a credit card, so you should check beforehand or have cash prepared. Take your receipt to the cashier and give it to the staff. They will check your receipt and let you know how much to pay.

Restaurant streets impart a sense of an old and good age

"Bourbon Road" (Map B2). That is what the restaurant street facing Tokyu Kamata Station is known as. The wild but popular taste of bourbon matches the atmosphere of this street, which may have caused the name to be given. Each shop on this street is unique. And it welcomes visitors with its appearance that makes one think of bourbon. If you want to enjoy an alcoholic drink and know the face of Japan, we recommend walking the bourbon road.

Sashimi

A representative Japanese dish in which you put soy sauce or wasabi on fresh raw fish.



Yakitori (Skewered Chicken)

Various parts of chicken are grilled with two different tastes of soy or salt.

Green onions and soy sauce on cold tofu. The refreshment of the throat is great.



Edamame

Young soy beans boiled in salt. The king of foods that you eat with alcoholic drinks. It goes especially well with beer.



Fried Chicken

Seasoned fried chicken. You can eat as many as you want, and it fills you up too.



Cooked or Boiled Fish

An indispensable dish for the Japanese. The deliciousness of fish can be enjoyed.



Salad

Enjoy fresh raw vegetables. Japanese salads can be easily eaten.

Winged gyoza. A Japanese-Chinese dish born out of Kamata.



Although gyoza originated in China, the Japanese changed it to match their taste buds. "Winged gyoza" is a famous dish of Kamata that creates a thin layer of crunchy skin around the gyoza. The combination of the light and fragrant skin and the juicy ingredients is great. If you have them with beer the meal can progress as much as you want.

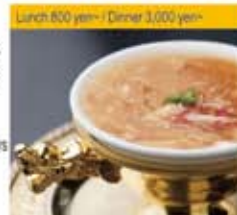

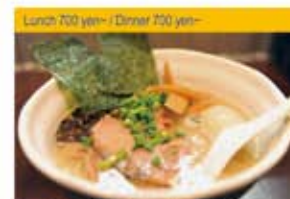

A Mysterious Time Spent at Shrines

Resting in a Quiet Place Amongst the Bustle



Kamata Hachiman Shrine, said to be here from 400 years ago

In the shrines and temples of Japan, there are always trees planted regardless of the size of the temple or shrines, and nature is utilized. This is because respect for nature plays a great part in the faith of Japanese people. Over a long period of time prayer and nature became one in this holy place, and it imparts a quiet peace to all who visit. Old shrines and temples in the Kamata area, such as Hieta Shrine, which was established over 700 years ago by an order of monks who helped build a great statue in the ancient capital of Nara, and Kamata Hachiman Shrine, which is said to have had a round tomb within its boundaries and has long been considered a holy site are just some examples. Even if they are in the proximity of the bustling areas of the city, if you step inside your body will be surrounded by a mysterious calm.
